ALTERNATIVE TO A HANDGUN UNDER THE BED...

I know some of you won GUNS but this is something to think about.....

If you don't have a gun, or don't want to use one, here's a more humane way to wreck someone's evil plans for you. I was previously unaware of this. (I guess I can get rid of the baseball bat.)

Wasp Spray— A friend who is a receptionist in a church in a high risk area was concerned about someone coming into the office on Monday to rob them when they were counting the collection. She asked the local police department about using pepper spray and they recommended to her that she get a can of wasp spray instead.

The *wasp spray*, they told her, can shoot up to twenty feet away and is a lot more accurate, while with the pepper spray, they have to get too close to you and could overpower you. The *wasp spray* temporarily blinds an attacker until they get to the hospital for an antidote. [I'm guessing that the antidote is better than bullet-removal if you accidentally shoot a friend or family member.] She keeps a can on her desk in the office and it doesn't attract attention from people like a can of pepper spray would. She also keeps one nearby at home for home protection. This may be of use to you.

On the heels of a break in and beating that left an elderly woman in Toledo dead, self defense experts have a tip that could save your life.

Val Glinka teaches self-defense to students at Sylvania Southview High School. For decades, he's suggested putting a can of *wasp and hornet spray* near your door or bed. Glinka says, "This is better than anything I can teach them." Glinka considers it inexpensive, easy to find, and more effective than mace or pepper spray. The cans typically shoot 20 to 30 feet; so if someone tries to break into your home, Glinka says "spray the culprit in the eyes". It's a tip he's given to students for decades.

It's also one he wants everyone to hear. If you're looking for protection, Glinka says look to the spray. "That's going to give you a chance to call the police' maybe get out." Maybe even save a life.

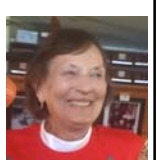
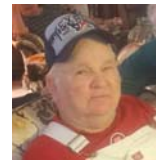


CHOSIN FEW

A LITTLE KNOWN FACT . . .

For all you landlubbers. Bet you didn't know this;

In the old days of sailing ships, all warships, and some merchantman carried iron cannons. These cannons fired round cannonballs.
