MEMORIAL DAY MAY 28, 2007



Memorial day dawned with heavy overcast skies and a promise of rain. Fortunately we only received sprinkles before the ceremony began, then the sun shone bright during the rest of the morning.

Bill Balleza, anchor on local KPRC, Channel 2 news, served as the Master of Ceremony. The Colors were presented by the TLSC. Buddy Blair and Bob Mitchell presented the Cemetery flag and the U.S. flag, with Ted Maloy and Lee Henderson as guards. The National Anthem was sung by Josh Flynn USMC, (Josh is also a member of the Lone Star Chapter) followed by the *Parade of Colors* led by the Lone Star Chapter. Stoney Stone presented the *POW/MIA Ceremony*. Stoney has presented this at many gatherings and it is always a solemn and meaningful presentation. During the *Parade of Wreath's* our organization's wreath was presented by Chapter President Charles Ehrlund and wife Ruby.



The Memorial Day Prayer was led by Charles Laird, USMC, and member of the TLSC/KWVA. The keynote speaker was LTC W.E.B. (Willie) Blackmon, USAF, & Ret. Judge with the Houston Municipal Courts. Blackmon is also an associate member of the Lone Star Chapter, as his father was a Korean War Vet and former member of our organization until his death. Blackmon's outstanding career contributions were recognized when he was selected to serve as an international election supervisor in Bosnia in 1997.

A very impressive Rifle Salute was presented by three details. Leading off was the VFW District 4 Ceremonial Detail, firing M-1 rifles, with blanks. This was followed by the Co. A 13th U.X. Regular Infantry, firing Muskets and the last volley being fired by the 15th Texas Infantry (Confederate). firing muskets, with extra gun powder. These were extremely loud. Echo taps followed, ending a very impressive ceremony. The Sons of the Confederate Veterans and Sons of the Union Veterans fired cannons. The colors were then retired by the Lone Star Chapter.

Our organization had a very good turnout with 21 members with 13 wives present. We also had a flag hanging above our section, indicating who we were.

The good Lord had kept the sky's clear during the morning, but as cars left the cemetery and headed down I-45, the rain that held off all morning began. The rain than lasted the rest of the day, dropping and inch or more. We were lucky this year, because last year the event was rained out.



TEXAS MARINES MEDAL OF HONOR MONUMENT

On Saturday, May 25, 2007, under heavy sky's, Marines of all ages, gathered at Town Park in the Woodlands to honor and dedicate the Monument to the United States Marine, Medal of Honor, Texas Recipients. There were 17 Texans who have been honored with the highest military award, and now there is a monument to also honor them. From WW II, there are 5 recipients; Korea had 4 Marines and 1 Navy Corpsman and the Vietnam War had 7.

The bronze and black granite statue with the official U.S. Marine emblem - the eagle, globe and anchor - and the Medal of Honor elicited a round of "hoorahs" from the Marines. The names, ages, hometowns and year of the act of bravery are all etched in gold lettering and is very impressive.

Before the ceremony began, it rained. The heavy rain lasted about half an hour, with umbrellas everywhere, but failing to dampen the spirits of the 200+ crowd. No one left, we just stood or sat under umbrellas. Among the speakers was Bill Balleza, who is an anchor on Channel 2 news in Houston. Bill is a Vietnam Vet and his father was a Marine in Korea.

The inspiration for the monument came from four retired Marines, Tom Early, Burt Cabanas, Bill Leigh and Jim O'Connor as they reminisced and shared a fruit cake, still in its tin, that Bill had in Korea, 50 years ago. They discovered that the MOH winners were not honored with a monument.

On April 23, 2007, a vehicle accident took the life of noted author, David Halberstam. He was one of the best known and most important authors of our generation. He was 73 when he was killed in California on his way to an interview for another book, perhaps his 20th, about football this time. David Halberstam received the Pulitzer for his reporting about the Vietnam War. He wrote "*The Making of a Quagmire*" in 1964, later probably his most famous book, "*The Best and the Brightest*", about the men around Kennedy who were instrumental in thinking it up. For us, as Korean War veterans, it is significant that he had been working on a book about the Korean War "*The Coldest Winter*", which will be published in September by Hyperion Press.

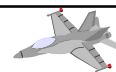

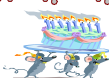

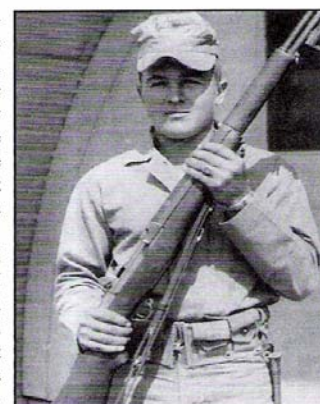
