

The intermingled images of the Memorial recall the unity and patriotism of those who served. A sculptural column of battle clad ground troops marches up a slope toward an American flag. Nearby is a grove of Linden trees encircling a reflecting pool. At the south edge of the memorial is a polished granite wall depicting hundreds of faces of those who supported the troops: airmen, chaplains, nurses, sailors,

artillerymen and others. Inscribed on the memorial, at the base of the flag, is this statement:

"Our Nation Honors Her Sons and Daughters Who Answered the Call to Defend a Country They Did Not Know and a People They Had Never Met. Korea, 1950-53."



SEVERAL COMPONENTS MERGE ON THE MALL TO FORM MONUMENT

Battle-ready soldiers wade through a ground cover and narrow concrete liners that represent rice paddies & irrigation ditches, past a wall of faces etched in stone, and forward toward their objective—an American flag waving high above a pool of rippling water. This is a memorial honoring those who served in the Korean War. Approximately 125,000 people attended the Thursday opening ceremony, during which President Clinton and South Korean President Kim Young Sam dedicated the Korean War Veterans Memorial.
